Approval of the Agenda

Councilor Ingham moved and Councilor Erickson seconded the motion to approve the agenda. Motion passed (6-0). Mayor Burge, aye; Council President Bernhard, aye; Councilor Ingham, aye; Councilor Meres, aye; Councilor Erickson, aye and Councilor Reed, aye.

Public Comments

Dick Trusky, Scappoose, explained he was concern about something. He stated last year we had the Pow Wow and he lives us above the park so he came down. He noticed that the Riverview Estate area was closed off to all the people that are tax payers in this town. He stated it is one of the few places that has curbs and sidewalks and is wide enough streets. All the people were parked mainly on this side of the creek where there are no sidewalks, curbs and they are walking down the middle of the street. He was just concerned and wondering was that neighborhood given permission to close off, is it a private neighborhood, gated or something or does it belong to the people of the City.

Mayor Burge replied if he recalls correctly is was closed off as one of the conditions of having the Pow Wow in that park because the neighbors up there were concern about people walking up through that neighbor beings it's so close and we were trying to divert parking to the designated parking area in the property next to the park.

Dick Trusky stated he can't see where or how, and thinks it's a shame, that you close off a neighborhood with public streets. He was told it was for people who live there to have guests come to their house. He asked why on earth when you have a safe area with sidewalks and curbs are you not allowing the people of the city to use those facilities to get to the park.

Chief Greisen explained why we did this last year was for the homeowners to be able to park on the street. The parking lot for the event is off of E. J. Smith Road. He explained what they will do also this year is the same concept of closing off the streets on 4th and 5th NW, so people can park in their own area. He explained one of the big issues that came up last year was Creekside apartments did a whole asphalt layover at the same time they did the Pow Wow so that is why you saw a lot more cars on the street.

Dick Trusky stated most of those homes in that area (Riverview Estates) have two car garages and a wide driveway and to close off a neighborhood to a bunch of people with a lot of kids and a lot of elderly people and have them eventually go over in that field. He thinks it is a travesty when people who live here and pay taxes are alienated because they don't live in that neighborhood.

Chief Greisen stated he wishes he would have brought this issue to the City after last years Pow Wow. He explained by City ordinance the City Manager is the road authority. He or she can restrict the parking. He explained during the event parking was restrict to permit parking only that they believed worked very well last year.

Dick Trusky heard a lot of people complain about it. He thinks its injustice. He asked City Manager Hanken if he is the one who has the final say so on this.

City Manager Hanken replied yes. He explained based upon the conversation with some of the neighbors and the people who sponsor the Pow Wow Festival the approval was given. He explained the City closes roads for a lot of festivals.

Councilor Ingham feels it should be equal for everyone. She didn't think we had any problems last year at the Pow Wow.

Chief Greisen replied you are correct, we had no complaints, and this is the first time that we are hearing a complaint.

Councilor Erickson stated you are probably closer to park in the field then on the streets.

Councilor Meres stated they are charging for parking. He is kind of thinking that they should open up the street this year.

Councilor Ingham stated it is a public street.

Councilor Reed stated last years Pow Wow was a new event and a new venue. He explained the organizers were very open to Councils concerns, they came to us before the event, and they came to us after the event and asked if there were issues. He thinks that they are open to addressing any complaints and like Chief Greisen said this is the first time we have heard a complaint regarding parking.

Councilor Ingham asked if there is anything that can be done regarding this issue as a compromise or is it set in stone.

City Manager Hanken replied he'll go back, this is the first time he has heard anything and it's almost a year from the last event. He stated the Pow Wow festival is moving forward and from his

standpoint he would like to see it continue the way it is now, just for another year, then to evaluate and we can make changes after it. He stated the Pow Wow is next week.

Councilor Ingham replied it is the 11th hour.

Dick Trusky stated well he gave it his best shot and he thinks he is right. He stated to Council that he thinks you people made a mistake and we could do better and right now he doesn't think we are going to.

Councilor Ingham feels we definitely need to revisit this for next years Pow Wow.

Councilor Meres and Councilor Ingham stated they really don't remember any discussion on parking.

Mayor Burge explained he thinks this is something they will look at for next years Pow Wow.

Mayor Burge explained we close 2nd Street every Saturday for Farmers Market.

Mayor Burge thanked Dick Trusky.

Consent Agenda ~ June 18, 2012 City Council meeting minutes

Councilor Ingham moved and Council President Bernhard seconded the motion to approve the Consent Agenda ~ June 18, 2012 City Council meeting minutes. Motion passed (5-0). Mayor Burge, aye; Council President Bernhard, aye; Councilor Meres, aye; Councilor Erickson, aye and Councilor Reed, aye. Councilor Ingham abstained.

New Business

Fund Exchange Agreements with ODOT

City Planner Varricchione went over the staff report. He explained every city within the state is allocated a certain amount of funds, these are Federal Transportation Funds, and in order to access those dollars the City needs to sign an agreement with ODOT. He explained typically allowable projects are paving, overlays, crack seals and other roadway projects. He explained in order to access the funds from 2011/2012 there is a new agreement and that would give the City approximately \$139,500. He explained there's a termination to an old agreement. Staff is asking for Councils approval.

Councilor Ingham moved and Councilor Erickson seconded the motion that Council approve ODOT Fund Exchange Agreement 28442 and approve Amendment Number 3 to ODOT Fund Exchange Agreement number 23298. Motion passed (6-0). Mayor Burge, aye; Council President Bernhard, aye; Councilor Ingham, aye; Councilor Meres, aye; Councilor Erickson, aye and Councilor Reed, aye.

Resolution No. 12-13: A Resolution Establishing All Fees and Charges for the City of Scappoose and Rescinding Resolution No. 11-14

City Manager Hanken went over the staff report. He explained staff is recommending some changes to this new fee resolution; staff is recommending waiving discovery fees for court appointed attorneys, ending the 50% discount for Sewer and Transportation System Development charges, an adding a 3.55% CPI adjustment to System Development Charges. All SDC fees are listed for customer ease.

Councilor Ingham moved and Councilor Reed seconded the motion to approve Resolution No. 12-13: A Resolution Establishing All Fees and Charges for the City of Scappoose and Rescinding Resolution No. 11-14. Motion passed (6-0). Mayor Burge, aye; Council President Bernhard, aye; Councilor Ingham, aye; Councilor Meres, aye; Councilor Erickson, aye and Councilor Reed, aye.

2013 League of Oregon Cities Legislative Agenda

City Manager Hanken went over the staff report. He explained the League of Oregon Cities (LOC) is requesting assistance in preparing its 2013 Legislative agenda. He explained Council should have received a sheet that needs to be filled out and turned back in to him. He explained once he receives them he will present the top four at the next Council meeting and Council will need to formally make a motion that says those are your items. He will then forward them to the League of Oregon Cities. He strongly encourage Council to gets that information to him as soon as possible.

Fluoridation of City Water

City Manager Hanken went over the staff report. He explained during the budgetary process there were some discussions about wanting to reexamine adding fluoride to the City's water. He explained we have gone through this every couple of years, in terms of discussion and it is always one of those emotional things. With an election coming up it may be a good opportunity to put this on the ballot to have the citizens finally decide what it is they want to do with this issue. In terms of a cost because it is a National election there isn't going to be any cost except for the cost of writing the ballot measure and getting it on the agenda. In terms of really trying to decide what it is the voters of this community want this is probably the best and easiest way to ascertain the answer to that question. What staff is doing is recommending that Council authorize us to draft a resolution that it can go on the ballot.

Councilor Ingham stated she doesn't think this needs to go to a vote of the community only because it is a decision that needs quite a bit of, it's an informational, there is a lot of information that needs to be absorbed to make a real good decision as far as voting for or against it. She explained it is an emotional decision for her because her son has fluorosis in his teeth from all the vitamins that his pediatrician gave him growing up had fluoride in them; he brushed with fluoride tooth paste and was in a community that had fluoridated water. She explained because of the vitamins, that are normal vitamins for pediatricians to give all children and the fact that all tooth paste has fluoride in it; the water there is not a need for it to have fluoride. She had a discussion with Steve Wabschall after that Budget Committee meeting where it was brought up after they talked about it and he said yea, the guys hate handling it, they basically have to wear hazmat suites to fluoride the water because the chemicals are so dangerous.

City Manager Hanken replied not disagreeing with any of that.

Councilor Ingham stated it is very costly and she is thinking that Council can make this decision. She thinks that we should have Steve come and talk to us about it and give us more information

about the pros and cons and then have Council make the decision. She doesn't think the public is aware enough or that we can make them aware enough on that large of a scale for a vote.

Mayor Burge replied Steve Wabschall runs the sewer.

Judie Ingham replied she knows but she talked to Steve about the issue after the Budget meeting and he concerned her concerns. She explained he is just as well versed on it and knowledgeable about it as the others.

Councilor Meres replied he understands, he can go either way with this but you know what he knows nothing about it. He would feel more comfortable if this Council was going to make this decision that we had experts in here and he doesn't mean just from the City; some other people, even a local dentist or a scientist or something.

City Manager Hanken replied 2 years ago you had the local dentist show up and tell you to leave the fluoride in the water.

Councilor Meres stated he has never that conversation.

Mayor Burge replied and the guy who runs the natural path massage place across the way will come in and tell you the exact opposite of what the dentist will tell you and we'll end up with stacks of paper. He has gone through this a couple of times and all kinds of reading information and then you discuss it. In the past he has always defaulted with the dentists because they are dentist but Councilor Ingham makes a good argument and that is why he would like to bring it back on the agenda.

Councilor Ingham would like to know how many municipalities of our size in the State of Oregon still fluoridate their water and how many don't.

City Manager Hanken replied off the top of his head he knows not a lot of them do. He does know in the Mid West and the East Coast all communities do. He grew up with fluoridated water. Fluoride in the water to him is no big deal. He explained this issues in terms of Oregon communities has been a very hot topic and he thinks, the last one was Sweet Home or something like that, they put the issue before the voters because again it kept going back and forth in term of do they, don't they. He explained you get one group that comes and says, like the dentist, leave it in and you'll get another group that says no take it out. It is just back and forth.

Councilor Ingham asked what is the cost on an annual basis to fluoridate the water.

City Manager Hanken replied that is minimal, the chemicals are like \$5,000 a year. He thinks that's what we budget a year in that line item and that is minimal and he is not going to disagree it's a hazard. He also for those of you who remember when he pointed out that the hazard and toxicity level Jim Huffman ripped his head off because it was like he was grandstanding. He stated a tablespoon of fluoride is enough to kill a person. All the sudden he's going off the deep end on that. Like he said this has been before you before. There was discussion, one lady, he can't think of the ladies name, because she had some sort of an illness wanted the fluoride out of the water. Council kind of went yeah we want to do that, all the sudden the dentist all show up and then you know we are back at the same spot where we keep the fluoride in. He guesses where he is going with an

election, again because it's that time of the year, this isn't going to cost us anything, let the public have their say.

Councilor Meres stated he would go with the voting and maybe we can utilize the Chamber of Commerce to have a forum on this, which they normally do, and we could see if we could get the auditorium at the High School and any informational let the experts speak.

Mayor Burge replied back on what he has seen in other communities when it goes to the votes the groups of people who are for and opposed to it go out and get their message out as to why it should be or why it shouldn't be. That is sometimes what elections are. This is one of those issues whatever reason people are passionate on one side or the other and it maybe truly a west coast thing because City Manager Hanken says you go back to the Midwest were water is naturally fluoridated and they are actually removing fluoride in water back in the Midwest.

Councilor Reed asked Councilor Ingham what is fluorosis.

Councilor Ingham replied fluorosis is too much fluoride in your system and what it does is it degrades the strength of your teeth and turns them off color and make them kind of translucently off color and degrades the strength of your enamel in your tooth. So too much fluoride, that is the thing about fluoride, just enough is exactly perfect because it prevent cavities, but if you have too much fluoride it is a detriment and it can cause problems.

Council President Bernhard stated in Sweet Home was that brought up by concerned citizens and that's why they decided to bring it to the ballot.

City Manager Hanken replied yes.

Council President Bernhard replied because in this particular scenario here we have a have a Councilmember who has brought it up again within the Budget Committee and he believes also last year but we haven't had any concerned citizens come in front of us for a couple years now at least.

City Manager Hanken replied not in front of you but he does believe the Mayor has talked to an individual.

Mayor Burge stated the guy that opened the business across the way with the massage therapy next to the liquor store. He explained during the Sauerkraut Festival last year he was doing a petition on fluoride, just a basic petition. He never presented it to anyone that he knows of but he knows he was doing a petition. He was actually kind at first figuring, knowing how Councilor Ingham feels about the fluoride, figuring that when he brought that petition forward we would have the discussion and he just never did. Then Councilor Ingham brought it up again during Budget Committee and we said okay we are going to address this issue this summer, we are going to bring it back. He assumed that once we put fluoride on the agenda it's gets out there.

Council President Bernhard stated he guesses where he is going with this is a couple of different things; one is we haven't had anybody really come up and say something to us at all especially here in the Council Chambers for years and he has not been personal approached either. To either put it on the ballot or even to readdress it at a Council level because we just haven't had any concern over it to be honest with you. He understands Councilor Ingham's position on it and he is not opposed to her position but again it is one of those scenarios where it's are we bringing this up because of our

own personal feelings or are we bringing this up because we have concerned citizens that have an issue with this and we need to discuss it and there are two different things there.

Mayor Burge replied she is a concerned citizen.

Council President Bernhard stated we have concerned citizen, which he is not saying one voice can't be heard but what he is saying now we are moving from other topics or other issues that we need to be addressing that potentially have he guesses a larger audience inside of having one concerned citizen. He stated which again their voice does count but is it to the point where we have to readdress it. He has been to the point too for the last nine years we had a couple different times and it took meetings, little alone not just one meeting, but meetings to decide to keep the fluoride in or not. He also agrees with Councilor Ingham saying to allow the voters to do it, that's fine. If we have concerned citizens coming to us saying we want to vote on this, then absolutely let's put it on the ballot, he doesn't have a problem with that. He just feels like we are addressing an issue that is it really an issue that needs to be addressed.

Councilor Ingham replied well it is important to be proactive in stuff like this she thinks when it affects the health of the citizens who generally probably aren't aware that it might have an affect on them one way or another. If the general person who had knowledge about fluoride out there and the only reason why she does is she was there an experienced it, but if a normal person with kids knew that our water was fluoridated they wouldn't let their pediatrician give them vitamins with fluoride in it.

Council President Bernhard stated potentially.

Councilor Ingham stated and make sure that their kid doesn't swallow their toothpaste when they are brushing their teeth but the normal person is not aware.

Councilor Reed replied he agrees with Councilor Ingham because the average person is probably uninformed and the uniformed voter he can see them saying we've had fluoride all this time that must be a good thing I'll vote yes. He sees it passing if we take it to the voters. He thinks it is something that Council needs to decide on our own.

Council President Bernhard replied he agrees totally with what Councilor Reed just said right there and the thing is though he guess that if he is passionate about a particular item them is effecting other members of my community then I am going to reach out to those people in my community and I am going to find a common voice; I am going to find other people that support my agenda, it what it is. So if, by all means, if there are other people out there that are potentially concerned about the fluoride within our water bring them in, let's talk to them and find out if this truly a concern or not. He agrees with Councilor Reed also that from an uneducated voters standpoint really don't understand the consequence what's going on. Here's an opportunity for anyone who is passionate about a particular item to reach out to their community and say do you know this is going on.

Councilor Meres stated he would put it on the ballot but again he thinks that Council should advertise this and try to work with the Chamber of Commerce and have a forum where both sides are there and fill up the auditorium and inform the voters. He stated it is a big decision of something in their drinking water.....

Councilor Ingham asked can we put it on the water bill and a notice in the paper that it is going to be on the agenda for one of our Council meetings and see what the response is and if we need to move it to a larger venue then we can do that.

Council President Bernhard asked then is the City really soliciting then a response or should it really be more of an action committee that feels strongly about this issue. He asked why should the City reach out to the voters to solicit a response, why can't it be a concerned citizen like yourself or anybody else in this community to reach out to community members to say hey this is a potential issue here. He doesn't think it is the City's position here to solicit a response.

Councilor Ingham replied it is not to solicit a response, it is to inform and let people know there is going to be discussion on it and it gives people a common area to come together to talk about the issue. She is not trying to evoke any kind of response one way or another.

Council President Bernhard replied but we do that all the time on a basis on the agenda.

Councilor Ingham replied I know but look at that all the people that are here, look at all the people that are here that know what we are talking about tonight.

Council President Bernhard replied what is determined that is all the sudden this is the super important one so we have to send this out on the water one. He asked is the parking issue with the Pow Wow, do we put that out on the water bill. He asked does the Council have to decide what is the most important items that we have to put on the water bill to bring people in.

Councilor Ingham replied the reason why the water bill is because there is fluoride in the water.

Councilor Reed replied I respectfully disagree with you. The issue came up it was on our agenda, it came up for us to make a decision, some kind of a decision on it.

Mayor Burge stated one of the things that we can do, it appears that it was put on the agenda and the word didn't really get out that it was on the agenda. What we can do, he doesn't know if we would have time to do it on the water bill just because of time. If we made the decision to put it on the ballot we have deadlines.

City Manager Hanken stated I will just say this people get their water quality reports you should see where it says we fluoridate the water. They also, he is sorry, do not read the little notice in the water bill. They will look at a separate letter that is with it and we do that. That is more effective then writing a little blurb.

Councilor Ingham stated so that is a reason to not even address this issue.

Mayor Burge replied and City Manager Hanken replied no.

City Manager Hanken replied if you are reaching people putting that little notice is not going to do much good. He stated the other thing you have got be careful of is if you are trying to reach people notices go to the owners of apartments, so not everybody who is a tenant in that apartment is going to get that notice. Also you have organizations like the Springlake Manufactured Home Park where there are a hundred and forty some houses there and only one bill.

Councilor Ingham replied that is a small percentage of the population.

City Manager Hanken replied he understands that but what he is tell her though is there are flaws with the concept on just putting it in the water bill and everyone will get it.

Mayor Burge stated he thinks what will be better is we are having this discussion right now; we put it off until either the next meeting or the meeting after that.

City Manager Hanken replied we will need at least the meeting after that.

Mayor Burge stated allow Councilmember's that are interested in it and the newspaper, we could let people know this is going to be the big issue we are discussing, we are going to have this discussion. People can come in, we can do a hearing, let people give us their opinion.

City Manager Hanken stated he would have it as the only thing on the agenda.

Mayor Burge replied yes, that is what he is saying, the only thing on the agenda. He thinks that is the best way. He thought putting fluoridation on the agenda for tonight he thought it would be packed.

City Manager Hanken replied it is never packed until you go through some sort of a motion to do this. What this asked is do you want.....

Mayor Burge stated yes, I think what we want to do is allow people to come in a let us know what they think.

Council President Bernhard asked on what basis. Again he is going back that he is not disputing that we should have a conversation about it but again to him it seems like we are discussing really a nonissue. It isn't in front of us; we haven't had anyone come up and tell us.....

Councilor Ingham replied but we will.

Mayor Burge stated under Council rules and the Charter each Councilmember has the authority and right to request something on the agenda; Councilor Ingham requested this to be on the agenda and that is where it came from.

Council President Bernhard replied okay, understood and he is not opposed to having the discussion on the agenda. He just feels the Council is opening pandoras box when there has been no complaint, there has been nothing. It is like we are searching for a problem that isn't there in front of us. We are hoping there is a problem there that is not in front of us and he doesn't know where all the sudden we become satisfied with this until we actually bring everybody in here and we actually created a problem and now we can say alright now we got something going on here. He hasn't had one other concerned citizen come in here in years and say that they are worried about this and now all the sudden we are going to turn this into a special meeting and we are going to announce it to everybody and we are going to take all these extra steps. He just doesn't get it.

Councilor Ingham replied she rarely disagrees with her fellow councilor. She explained the whole thing is that like she said before people haven't come in and addressed the issue because they are not educated about the issue. If a lot of people knew what the issue was and had any kind of idea

what the health ramifications are you would have a lot more people in here talking to you about it. She stated the percentage of fluorosis is small, it is not a huge percentage of people that get fluorosis but it can affect enough people in the community to where we can yank the fluoride out the water. They get enough fluoride from what they need from other sources rather than the water.

Councilor Meres stated he thinks we should hear Judie out; she is a concerned citizen, tax payer. But the other thing is do you think League of Oregon Cities can give us a number of how many cities in Oregon are fluoridating your water.

City Manager Hanken explained it is quicker to go through our mechanism of the Oregon City recorders.

Councilor Reed asked why did we pick fluoride, we could have been anything.

Mayor Burge replied the local dentists requested it.

City Manager Hanken stated because of the ability to fight cavities.

Councilor Ingham asked City Manager Hanken if he could contact the Spotlight and make sure it is on the website as well.

Councilor Meres asked how soon if we decide to put it on the ballot.....

Mayor Burge replied if we are doing it then we are not putting it on the ballot, we are making the decision, the Council will make the decision at that point.

City Manager Hanken replied yes the Council will make that decision.

Mayor Burge stated because it will be too late.

Announcements

Mayor Burge went over the calendar.

City Manager

City Manager Hanken explained he sent an email to Council related to Congresswomen Bonamici visit to talk about economic development job creation it will be here at City Hall at 3:45 p.m. on July 5. He explained July 5 is also the last day related to the appeal related to the UGB proposal. He explained the City did receive the check from the Assisted Living Facility for the advanced funding reimbursement and that should resolve the issue.

Police Chief

Police Chief Greisen thanked Dick Trusky for coming tonight. He explained one of the things he is going to do this year for this Pow Wow is monitor how much traffic is actually parked on there by the permit holders because there might be no need for that in the future.

Council

Councilor Meres stated now that the new company has taken over Rose Valley Assisted Living Facility it has really shaped up with new carpet, new roof, they painted and lots of yard work. He talked about the cameras that are broken at the Watts House. He stated we need to find somebody to service those cameras. Also he would like to be shown how to use the system.

Council President Bernhard explained he would like to request that we put terms limits on an upcoming meeting prior to December.

Councilor Meres stated we should reopen the Charter for discussion, not just the term limits.

Councilor Ingham stated there was some discussion regarding traffic on the end of 6th street and Frederick regarding no stop signs. She drives that everyday and there was a truck parked and she came around that corner and came very close to a kid on a bike. It's a hazard because there is an obstruction of vision. She doesn't know if a stop sign on 6th Street going south would solve the problem or if not letting the gentleman who owns the house on the corner park in front of his house. She said it's dangerous.

Chief Greisen will meet with Terry Andrews regarding restriping that area because in some areas stop lines are too far back from where they should be.

Councilor Ingham stated she talked to a couple people in the neighborhood about the increase in traffic through the neighborhood rather than just coming down Frederick and coming down 6th Street. She is wondering if signs can be put up that say "no thru traffic".

Chief Greisen replied it's a public road way. He explained when there are too many signs out there people aren't paying attention of what's going on.

Mayor Burge explained he has had conversations with people in that neighborhood too and one of the things he discussed with them is some of that increased traffic that they see is a change of the traffic pattern within the neighborhood.

Councilor Erickson explained he won't be here on July 16.

Councilor Reed explained he will probably be out of town on the 16th of July. He talked about the rust at the new school field that is on the fence, the building and the sidewalks from sprinkler system.

City Manager Hanken replied he is not sure if the School District, in terms of the sprinkler systems, has a separate well that they use for irrigation.

Mayor Burge explained there was also another email that he received on 3rd Street and Columbia Avenue that intersection that was poorly designed.

City Manager Hanken stated here are the issues ~ the ordinance that states you can put your the building is built up to the street, you have the trees are growing, but the trees have been trimmed.

Mayor Burge replied it's not the trees that are really the issue, it's when you have cars parked on both sides of that road there is not enough room on that road to travel.

City Manager Hanken replied but the citizens issue was the visibility.

Mayor Burge stated it was both.


City Manager Hanken stated the solution is no parking on both sides.


Mayor Burge and Councilor Ingham replied or one side.

City Manager Hanken explained he already spoke with Mr. Rosenthal and he is okay with extending the no parking. Again you can't do one side without the other because no matter where a car is parked somebody is going to be into the other lane and you are still going to have that issue in terms of coming around the corner because there isn't a lot of visibility especially if somebody is parked in front of Mr. Rosenthal's building right before that corner.
